EVIDENCE SUMMARY OF LESLIE FRISBY 30 August 2024

- 1. My name is Leslie Clifford Frisby. I am a farmer and agricultural contractor from Southland. I live and farm in the Titiroa Stream area.
- I made a submission in support of this application and have been asked by Council to help you understand what it is like to be a farmer who relies on the locks.
- 3. I have been farming in the area since 1982 and was in the Titiroa Catchment before the current gates were there. Pre-gates the land was very wet and full of gorse and rushes. Because it was so wet it was uneconomical to farm. I now lease 4 blocks from the Council and run 2500 ewes, 600 hoggets, 40 rams and fatten 300 cattle and 250 calves. I also run a few cows and deer.
- 4. Back when I came to the area, if a big flood came through or there was a big tide, portions of the farm would go underwater and the impact on the farm was significant.
- Once the gates were installed, I did a lot of work on the land including fencing and installing tile and mole drains. This has meant the land can now handle a flood as the water table is much lower. I agree with Mr Young that the gates control the water table up to the railway embankment.
- 6. I am very worried that if the locks are removed the land would no longer be farmable. The drains on their own are not enough and I understand water will push back up them if the gates are removed.
- 7. The community relies on the gates. I employ five staff fulltime all year around. Most of our work is local and without the locks I am sure my agricultural contracting business would also be in trouble.
- 8. In my 40 years in the area there has regularly been good runs of whitebait along the Titiroa Stream and plenty of eels, trout and other fish.
